

A potted history of CLCH

Central London Community Healthcare (CLCH) was formed in 2009 from an alliance of the community service provider arms of three London PCTs (Hammersmith and Fulham, Kensington and Chelsea, and Westminster) and welcomed Barnet Community Services on 1 April 2011.

Since then there have been a range of changes as the trust has grown to cover nine London boroughs and Hertfordshire. Below is a brief history of key dates:

April 2017	Stroke support service in Barnet and a falls prevention service in Brent join CLCH.
May 2016	Harrow adults community services join CLCH
April 2016	Merton community services join CLCH
September 2015	Strategic partnership with Capita goes live
July 2015	Hertfordshire Sexual Health Services join CLCH.
April 2015	Care Quality Commission carries out first full inspection of CLCH. Results published in August 2015 confirm a rating of Good.
April/May 2015	Brent School Nursing and Hounslow Diabetes services join CLCH.
October 2014	Hertfordshire Respiratory Services join CLCH.
2011/2012	Proposals to become a Foundation Trust developed with initial consultation in early 2012.
April 2011	Barnet Community Services joins CLCH.
February 2011	February 2011 James Reilly joins the Trust as Chief Executive.
November 2010	CLCH established by the Department of Health as a new NHS Trust.
April 2010	CLCH is registered with the Care Quality Commission (CQC) without conditions, whilst still part of NHS Kensington and Chelsea. DH supports plans to establish CLCH as a new NHS trust following rigorous assessment.
July 2009	Rebranding to Central London Community Healthcare.
April 2009	Responsibility for managing Central West London Community Services is devolved to NHS Kensington and Chelsea (PCT). The Joint Provider Committee becomes a formal committee of the Board but is set up so that it can also have its own sub committees to enable ease of separation in the future.

March 2009	Central West London Community services is granted autonomous provider organisation (APO) status by NHS London.
February 2009	PCT boards approve decision to transfer the business and staff of Central West London Community Services to a host PCT (Kensington and Chelsea PCT).
April 2008 - January 2009	Business case developed to bring the community provider services of Hammersmith & Fulham, Kensington & Chelsea, and Westminster primary care trusts together.
